2. ICI Awards

A highlight of the Institute each year is the awarding of several honours, as outlined below:

2.1 The Boyle Higgins Gold Medal and Lecture Award

One of the most prestigious honours that can only be bestowed on a member of the Institute is the Boyle Higgins Gold Medal and Lecture Award. This award, which was established in 1985, is an award for research work carried out in chemistry under the headings: (a) Pure Chemistry, (b) Applied and Industrial Chemistry or (c) Chemical Education. The award recognizes a chemist of any nationality working in Ireland or a chemist who is an Irish citizen working overseas who has made an outstanding and internationally recognised research contribution to the advancement of chemistry. On behalf of



the Institute, may I congratulate **Professor Suresh Pillai (Sligo IT)** on being the recipient in 2019. Professor Pillai received his gold medal and delivered an outstanding award lecture entitled 'Materials in the Nanoscale; From the Laboratory to Industries' at a special ICI award ceremony held in RCSI on 11th April of this year.

A call for nominations for the 2020 award was sent out to all members of the Institute and to all Heads of Schools and Heads of Departments of Chemistry in July of this year. The Institute received a number of outstanding applications. All nominations were sent out for external review to three independent, international experts. All reviewers commented on the excellent standard of the nominations with one reviewer congratulating the Institute 'on such an exquisite choice of candidates'. I am delighted to announce that the recipient of the award for 2020 is **Professor A.P. De Silva (QUB).** This will mark the 35th anniversary since the establishment of this award. We very much look forward to Professor De Silva's award lecture. Further details to follow early in the New Year.

2.2 The ICI Annual Award for Chemistry (Eva Philbin Public Lecture Series)

This award was inaugurated by the Institute of Chemistry of Ireland in 2005 and since 2007, is named in memory of the late Eva Philbin, who was Professor of Organic Chemistry at UCD. The award, consisting of a commemorative plaque, is made to a practicing chemist, who has made a significant contribution to the advancement of chemistry and who is also an excellent science communicator. The recipient may be employed in academia, industry or in the state sector. The purpose of this award is to promote the benefits of chemistry to the widest possible audience. The recipient presents their award lecture in Dublin and in two other locations in Ireland and the lectures must be open to the general public. Our warmest congratulations to **Professor Anita Maguire (UCC)** on being the 2018 recipient. Her award lecture was entitled 'Using Hazardous Reagents Safely - Go with the flow!'.



There was an open call for nominations for this award again this year. Nominations were reviewed by three independent reviewers. It gives me great pleasure, on behalf of the Institute, to announce that the recipient of the award for 2019 is **Professor Declan McCormack from TU Dublin**. Further details in relation to Professor McCormack's lectures will be advertised in due course.

2.3 The ICI David Brown Award

This award was established in 2014 to honour Professor David Brown of University College Dublin in recognition of his enormous contribution to inorganic chemistry both nationally and internationally. Professor Brown, together with Professor Bill Davis (TCD) hosted the International Conference on Coordination Chemistry (ICCC) in UCD in 1974. With some funds remaining, Professor Brown set up what became known as the Greystones weekend meetings, which were held in the LaTouche Hotel in Greystones and later in a more formal setting, in Maynooth University, hosted by Dr Malachy McCann every three years until 2005. This was re-launched as a one day Inorganic Ireland Symposium and has been held approximately every two years since then. A highlight of this symposium is the presentation of the ICI David Brown award to a colleague who has made an outstanding contribution to inorganic chemistry. **Dr Malachy McCann** (then NUIM and now MU) received the inaugural ICI David Brown award in 2014. **Professor A. K. Powel** (Karlsruhe Institut fur Technologie, Germany) received the award in 2016. **Professor Sylvia Draper** (TCD) was the most recent recipient where she was presented with this award during the Inorganic Ireland Symposium, which was held in Queen's University Belfast in December 2018. Professor Draper delivered an outstanding award lecture entitled 'Molecular Aromatic Platforms (MAPS): unexpected destinations from somewhat coordinated journeys'.



It is notable that 2026 will mark the historic return of the International Conference of Coordination Chemistry to Dublin, with special thanks to Professor Draper's efforts in spearheading a successful bid during the 43rd International Conference of Coordination Chemistry in Japan in 2018.

2.4 **The ICI Postgraduate Award**

This award is a relative new award of the Institute. First established in 2018, it recognises a registered PhD student in any Chemistry discipline working in an Irish Higher Education Institution. The student must have demonstrated excellence in research through publications. They must also have demonstrated a commitment to supporting and promoting Chemistry within their Institution (e.g. through active participation in public engagement initiatives).

Our warmest congratulations to Ms Adele Gabba (NUIG), working under the supervision of Professor Paul Murphy (NUIG), on being a most worthy recipient of this inaugural postgraduate award. Ms Gabba received her award at a special award ceremony in RCSI in April 2019. She also delivered an outstanding award lecture at the 71st Irish Universities Chemistry Research Colloquium, which was jointly hosted by TU Dublin and RCSI on the 20th -21st June 2019. Adele also kindly agreed to represent the ICI as its **postgraduate ambassador**. In this regard, she surveyed Chemistry postgraduate students to get their feedback on how the ICI can better support them. While they welcomed the introduction of the postgraduate award, they would also like to receive travel grants to support their research. The ICI Council is currently analysing all of the results from this survey.

Again, there was an open call for this award in July 2019. I am delighted to announce that the second recipient of this award is Ms Saoirse Dervin (Sligo IT). Saoirse was nominated by her supervisor,

Warmest congratulations to **Ms Jessica Murphy** (Mount Mercy College, Model Farm Road, Co. Cork) and **Mr Corey Kissane** (St. Brendan's College, Killarney, Co. Kerry) on being the most recent recipients and to their schools and teachers. Both Jessica and Corey, together with their school principals, Chemistry teachers and proud parents attended the special ICI award ceremony in RCSI in April 2019 where they were awarded their medals which I have no doubt they will treasure. May I thank Ms Mary Mullaghy, our honorary secretary, who delivered a powerful insight into the rigorous review process conducted by the Department of Education and Skills into the selection of these worthy recipients during this award ceremony.

3. The 44th ICI Annual Congress

The first ICI Congress entitled 'Pharmaceutical and Fine Chemical Industry' was hosted by UCD in May 1976. This Congress has been running annually since then, with the exception of two years. On behalf of the Institute, may I take this opportunity to congratulate Dr Robert Elmes who hosted the 44th ICI Annual Congress in his home Institution, Maynooth University on 20th May 2019. The program, which comprised oral and poster presentations covered a broad range of topics under the general theme 'Molecular Sensing and Imaging'. Speakers included Prof. Eric Anslyn (University of Texas, Austin, USA), Prof. A. P. De Silva (QUB), Prof. Frances Heaney (MU), Dr. Susan Quinn (UCD), Prof. Donal O'Shea (RCSI), Prof. Silvia Giordani (DCU), Prof. Dmitri Papkovsky (UCC), Prof. Thorri Gunnlaugsson (TCD) and Prof. Tia Keyes (DCU). With over 70 delegates and 7 industrial sponsors, the attendees were treated to a day full of ground breaking chemistry research. Several prizes were also awarded to early career researchers for the presentation of their work.

4. 71st Irish Universities Chemistry Research Colloquium

The 71st Irish Universities Chemistry Research Colloquium was jointly hosted by TU Dublin and RCSI on the 20th-21st June 2019. Professor John Cassidy (TU Dublin) and Dr Darren Griffith (RCSI) were co-chairs of the local organising committee. Congratulations to this committee on hosting this highly successful Colloquium, which was much enjoyed by over 170 postgraduate students and staff. Amongst the highlights of the colloquium were two outstanding plenary lectures delivered by Professor Luuk van der Wielen, Director, Bernal Institute and Chair of Biosystems Engineering & Design, University of Limerick and Distinguished Professor for Biobased Economy, TU Delft, The Netherlands and Dr. Francesca Paradisi, Professor in Pharmaceutical and Bioorganic Chemistry, University of Bern, both of whom delivered lectures related to the topic of sustainability. This was particularly pertinent given that sustainability was the theme of the Colloquium. Another highlight was a round table panel discussion with industrial and mentors experts which included Brian Glennon (APC), Brenda Moore, (TE Laboratories), Bernie Capraro (Intel), and Amanda Daly (SFI).

5. EuChemS Congress 2022

As stated earlier, in 2022, the ICI will celebrate its 100th anniversary and will mark this impressive milestone by hosting the European Chemical Society (EuChemS) Congress here in Dublin. This Society, as you know, is an umbrella organisation representing national Chemical Societies (including the ICI) and other chemistry-related organisations in Europe (<u>https://www.euchems.eu/</u>). Their Congresses typical attract in excess of 1500 delegates from around the world. What a wonderful opportunity for us to highlight all that is best about chemistry here in Ireland. This is a significant and exciting undertaking for the Institute. We will soon be reaching out to our chemistry community in Ireland for your support and expertise. Professor Thorfinnur (Thorri) Gunnlaugsson has kindly agreed to chair the Local Organising Committee. Our thanks to Professor Patrick Guiry (ICI Vice-President) who represented the ICI at the most recent EuChemS General Assembly at the Politehnica University of Bucharest, Romania in October 2019. Further details in relation to the Congress will be made available on the ICI website (currently under review), by email correspondence and/or in the Irish Chemical News which is circulated by email to all ICI members.

In the meantime, may I draw your attention to the EuChemS Chemistry Congress taking place in Lisbon, Portugal from 30th August – 3rd September 2020 (<u>https://www.euchems2020.org/</u>). Following



consultation with ICI members and Heads of Schools and Departments of Chemistry, Council has already nominated a number of colleagues from our Irish chemistry community as potential convenors and speakers. Professor John Cassidy is also on the International Scientific Committee for this Congress.
